



Graduation Requirements

In order to graduate from the Lake Washington School District, students must demonstrate proficiency in the following graduation standards:

Certificate of Academic Achievement (CAA): Earn the CAA from Washington State by demonstrating proficiency on the 10th grade English Language Arts (ELA) exit exam, the Math End of Course Assessments (EOC) and the Science End of Course Assessments (EOC)

High School and Beyond Electronic Planning Portfolio:

Create a High School and Beyond Plan that includes: (1) self-assessment of interests and aptitudes, (2) plan for their upcoming high school years by reviewing high school courses available to enable them to meet their post-secondary goals and LWSU graduation requirements, (3) develop tools for employment-both present and future.

Student Government

Eastlake has a traditional government with an ASB President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer and Public Relations Officer. Also, each class level elects a President, Vice President, and a Secretary/Treasurer.

Eastlake's Student Government enables the constituents to voice their opinions. It allows students, staff, parents and community leaders the opportunity to work together in making decisions for Eastlake's student-centered environment.

STUDENT SERVICES

Eastlake has established school systems that individualize education and address the needs of all students. Our integrated curriculum now extends beyond Language Arts and Social Studies to include STEM education and a Signature Program called Sammamish Start-Ups. To provide students with the necessary time and support to learn, Eastlake offers student interventions during the school day in Math, Science, Writing and World Language. We also offer a variety of pathways, which include 17 AP and eight University of Washington in the High School courses, as well as an array of Career and Technical Education classes such as Computer Science, Engineering, Business and Biotechnology.

Counseling

Eastlake's certified team of counselors is always ready and available to assist all students with personal counseling, college guidance, scheduling, career exploration and scholarship information.

Career Center

The career center gives students the opportunity to research any college, military branch and other information crucial to their future. Scholarship, volunteer and job opportunities are readily available for student and parent convenience.

Link Crew

Eastlake works deliberately to create a welcoming and positive culture for students. Eastlake has a Link Crew program where junior and senior Link Leaders guide and support incoming ninth graders through their first year.

Homeroom

Eastlake's Homeroom program links our students with the same caring faculty member for the entire four years they are at Eastlake. Homeroom provides academic support, addresses school culture, college and career planning, and other important issues in the lives of teenagers.

Running Start

Running Start is a dual credit program that is offered in the state to 11th and 12th grade students. Students can attend college classes and earn both college and high school credit. Some students will earn their AA degree at the same time as graduation.

WaNIC Courses—(Washington Network for Innovative Careers)

WaNIC is established to provide advanced-level Career and Technical Education programs based on rigorous academic and industry standards, preparing students for post-secondary education and successful entry into high-skill, high-demand careers and employment.

Schedule

High school schedules typically consist of six 50-minute periods. Eastlake offers an alternative method. Four days each week, students have 3 classes which last 95-100 minutes and on Fridays the students attend each of their six classes. This schedule closely resembles a college program and encourages reflection on new material and provides time to work on labs and projects that would be more difficult to complete with shorter periods.
